From this congenial Rest Home, preceded us, since I came to Pilgrim Place, to his Eternal Home the also beloved immortal Edward A. Steiner, Internationally famous Immigrant Authority and Friend.

My general health is apparently better than an octogenarian might reasonably expect to enjoy, and though outer vision darkens, the inner brightens. God has been infinitely good to me through life, and now after a cuarter of a century of anxious, homeless wandering has brought me to this truly unique home.
