





CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE IV, SECTION 3

CLAUSE 2: TERRITORY AND OTHER POSSESSIONS

The Constitution provides that Congress shall have the power to dispose of and regulate all Territory and other Possessions belonging to the United States, and to make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the same. This clause has been interpreted to grant Congress broad authority over federal territories and possessions, including the power to admit new states and to govern territories until they are admitted. The Supreme Court has held that Congress's power under this clause is plenary and exclusive, and that it is not subject to the same limitations as Congress's power over states. This power has been used to create and govern territories such as the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, and the Territory of Hawaii. The clause also provides that Congress shall have the power to make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the same, which has been interpreted to include the power to govern territories until they are admitted as states.
