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One reason that the first two books of *The Four Gospels* did not receive attention earlier (1979, "Matthew Reconsidered"; 1987, "Mark Reconsidered") is, I suspect, the author's desire to prove the case under consideration without getting sidetracked. That is what the author does in this present work. He begins by noting that there were other gospels, as had been noted and he then goes further and notes that, though there were, there are no known gospels, just the four canonical gospels. The author continues his argument by pointing out that the four canonical gospels are the only ones that have survived.

Consequently you have three choices when trying to reduce a deficit: you can increase taxes, decrease government spending or increase deficits again. The problem with increasing taxes is that it reduces the government's revenue which can only mean less available spending. However, there are responses to deficits that are not necessarily to increase taxes. The deficit could be partly reduced by reducing government spending. However, because the author has written such a comprehensive and open ended article, there is little that can possibly change or even further refine his position, perhaps the most significant aspect of this article is its emphasis on the importance of non-orthodox approaches and new research methods. The author's emphasis on the potentialities of an open and non-hierarchical approach to research methodology, and especially one based on "nonorthodox" perspectives like indigenous or folkways, can be considered innovative by comparison. His use of more common approaches, such as the "ethnographic eye," nevertheless illustrates the strengths and weaknesses of the ethnographic mode. The author's article is a good example of the strengths of the "ethnographic eye," because, given his emphasis on the "newer" aspects, he uses great energy and time discussing past research and concepts of gender, race and language and how they relate to the article's central theme.
