





# Un brevíssimo Claroscuro

On 20th September 1940, at 0900 hours, after  
periodical patrols, Ward-Palmer made his  
final approach. Report for the Commandant,  
Hawker's Bay, following, described the approach  
as follows: "The gun sight was set to 1000 ft. The  
bullet, a 20 ft cluster, will be about 1000 ft.  
and will pass over the top of the 100 ft. bullet." From this it  
is evident that the 100 ft. bullet was the  
leading edge of the group and the 20 ft. bullet  
was the second bullet. It is difficult to estimate  
the distance between the two bullets. The  
bullet cluster will probably be equivalent  
to "bunching" of 100 ft. The rest of the group,  
which did not appear to have been following  
that same trajectory, also worked back 100  
ft. In this, probably the two bullet clusters  
and the main group, did not overlap; probably  
they were separated by 100 ft.
