



Honoring Gabriel García Márquez

WASHINGTON—Colombian writer Gabriel García Márquez was in Washington, D.C., in September to participate in a film retrospective, "Gabriel Márquez and the World of Images" at the American Film Institute (AFI), and to be honored in a literary roundtable at Georgetown University.

Since the beginning of his career as a journalist, García Márquez demonstrated a unique interest in cinema and dedicated most of his early career to film criticism. Most recently, as president of the New Latin American Cinema

Foundation, he has succeeded in fostering the production, distribution, and presentation of film and other audiovisual productions by emerging artists. The screening at AFI included *Memories of My Mother*, *Chronicle of a Death Foretold*, *A Year to Live*, *Migos Cielos*, *The Broken Mirror*, and *The Blue Swallow*, which was directed by the author himself. This unique film retrospective was organized by the Cultural Foundation of the Americas (CFA), with key support from the Colombian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the collaboration of AFI.

Georgetown University's "Tribute to Gabriel García Márquez" included discussions of the writer's work and life by other outstanding Latin American writers and filmmakers, including Jorge Icaza of Bolivia; Roberto Aronson, Juan Luis Ceballos, Tomás Elío Hartman, Alicia Kates, and Antonio Skármeta. Skármeta also had an opportunity to meet and talk with García Márquez in a special session.

Georgetown's Center for Latin American Studies and the Faculty of Languages and Literatures.

Recently established under the patronage of Ana Milena Gaviria, wife of the secretary general, CFA is a nonprofit organization with the mission of promoting cultural cooperation and raising the nations of the Americas' and literary field, scenic arts, music, theater, dance, plastic arts, book fairs, and other regional artistic expressions. CFA also supports programs of regional and international cooperation regarding cultural exchanges and the flow of cultural information.

A Resolution on Indigenous Grounds

A coalition of 1700 Indians in an area near Iquitos, Peru, in Colombia, recently threatened to commit collective suicide if oil exploration activities planned by Occidental Petroleum Company were not halted.

Public controversy over the operations of Occidental in the area known as the "Sixteen Lakes" (home to indigenous communities of 1700 people) began last spring. In May 1997, Colombian Ministry of Foreign Relations asked the OAS General

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
