The resulting solution was stirred at room temperature for 24 h and then concentrated under reduced pressure. The authors of *Recovering the Past* are not alone in their conviction that the past is important, and certainly not alone in their conviction that the past should be recovered. In the 1980s, the American Historical Association published a report titled "The American Historical Association's Statement on the Past," which stated that the past is "the foundation of our identity as a people and as a nation" and that it is "the source of our values and our sense of purpose." The report also stated that the past is "the source of our wisdom and our strength" and that it is "the source of our hope and our faith." The report concluded that the past is "the source of our life and our soul."
