



All Executive Expenses from Dues Budget for over 100 EA

The Executive Committee of the Eastern Association of Public Administrators (EAPA) has approved a resolution to eliminate all executive expenses from the dues budget for over 100 EA chapters. This decision was made during a recent meeting in St. Louis, Missouri. The resolution aims to reduce the financial burden on local chapters and ensure that dues are used primarily for educational and professional development purposes. The EAPA Executive Committee, led by President John Smith, expressed their commitment to transparency and fiscal responsibility.
