Abstract The purpose of this study was to determine whether there were differences in the prevalence of self-reported depression between men and women who had been exposed to violence by intimate partners. Data from the National Longitudinal Study of Women's Health are used to examine the relationship between exposure to partner violence and self-reported depression among 67,000 women aged 27–42 years old. Results indicate that women who reported being physically or sexually abused by their current or former partners were more likely to report having experienced depression than those who did not experience partner violence. These findings suggest that exposure to partner violence may be a risk factor for depression.
